As guests on the land, DCAS is committed to reconciling harm caused by colonization in Dawson, in the Yukon, and across Turtle Island.

NOTE: This report reflects a change in DCAS' fiscal year, as approved by members at the 2021 Annual General Meeting.

To adjust to the new fiscal year, it spans a 15 month period from January 1, 2021 March 31, 2022.

Our mission is to increase the quality of life of Yukoners through the creation, presentation, and celebration of art, because we believe arts and culture creates strong, empowered communities.





Artist-In-Residency

Founded in 2001 in a partnership with Parks Canada, the Residency has welcomed over 300 talented artists, musicians and filmmakers to Dawson City from all regions of Canada and around the world.

The residency was still on "low-mode" due to the pandemic, so as in 2020, we were able to offer studio spaces to local artists. In small windows of time, we were able to host some artists from outside Dawson City.

Brigitte Jardin was able to come from Whitehorse as part of the 2021 Dawson City Music Festival Residency, and Scott Price also came up from Whitehorse for 4 weeks in September. Scott hosted an open studio visit.

The studio space for local artists was popular as it gave many artists without access to space room to work. Several artists also used the space to prepare for shows in the ODD Gallery.

In 2022 we were able to start offering residencies to our 2 year backlog of artists. We did not do a call for residencies for 2022 to accommodate residencies canceled due to COVID.

We have a full slate of residencies coming for 2022 and into 2023.

The future of the residency at Macaulay House still remains in question while Parks Canada decides what they wish to do with the building (it is on their disposal of assets list). In the meantime, a Board committee has been working on options should Macaulay house no longer be a viable venue for this program.

Education & Outreach

The 2020 pandemic prompted a swift shift in the way programs are planned and delivered. In 2021, emphasis was placed on securing funding to subsidize program and workshop expenses in order to provide programming at an affordable rate. This also allowed KIAC to offer courses and workshops with little or no minimum number of participants. Operating on a cost-recovery model was difficult as many courses were postponed or canceled due to last minute participant cancellations related to mandatory isolations, long wait times for COVID results, and the "stay home if you aren't feeling well" approach.

Despite the difficulties of programming inperson activities (such as the Confluence Exhibition series which was cancelled for 2021), the number of programs offered in 2021 is still comparable to a normal year thanks to community partnerships and inkind support.

We would like to highlight another notable new partnership - with Arts Underground in Whitehorse. With the support of "On Yukon Time" funding in the spring of 2021, KIAC was able to invite the pottery studio technician from Arts Underground to Dawson for two separate sets of educational intensives averaging about 15 hours each. This relationship has flourished and culminated into Dawson artists exhibiting work at various ceramics exhibitions at Arts Underground. The knowledge passed on during the intensives has been instrumental for the Drop-In Pottery program which now sees much more collaboration and lateral learning between participants.



Youth Art Enrichment 2021 and 2022

Youth Art Enrichment is an annual four-day art program for Yukon youth ages 14 – 18 led by professional artists. Students choose one of three mediums to study for the duration of the program, learning new skills, techniques, and ways to creatively make artwork for the world to see.

After the 2020 program was canceled a mere two days before youth were to arrive in Dawson (news of COVID-19 coincided with the program start date), the 2021 Youth Art Enrichment program contingency planning began. 2021 marked the 20th anniversary of the program and funding was secured for a multitude of options ranging from virtual programming to an "on the road" program to be delivered community by community.

In the end, even a small-scale Dawsononly program was deemed infeasible due to the changing covid restrictions at the time.

In 2022, the program was planned as a Dawson-only day camp with two streams, "A Printmaker's Primer: Handmade Prints with Meshell Melvin" and "Hip Hop Dance & Choreography with Val Herdes". Despite opening the program to grade 8 RSS students, there were not enough registrations to run both programs so the dance class has been postponed until later on in the summer.

Despite the challenges, we still offered many activities as a result of much collaboration, conversation, and consideration about how to best contribute to our community's quality of life without risking community members' health and safety. We are proud that we were able to work closely with several presenting partners to make a variety of performing arts events happen in person (with safety procedures in place), online, and through community radio. Throughout this time period, we became very adaptable and dynamic, always seeking out opportunities to collaborate, and have turned our focus towards elevating regional artists.

We were thrilled to finally be able to present live music for the first time since 2020.

Partnering with the Dawson City Music Festival Association, the Winter Concert Series ran from January - March 2021 after several false starts. In addition to providing opportunities for regional artists to share their music, the series prioritized compensating musicians fairly. Nearly all of these 2-night concerts sold-out with limited capacity, and were broadcast live on CFYT 106.9FM and online a cfyt.ca. Since the return of live performances, we've been continually adapting to the ever-changing realities of health restrictions.

We also found opportunities to assist presenting partners with their work, such as Music Yukon Arts in the Park, where we recorded Dawson musicians for virtual broadcast allowing local musicians to participate without travelling to Whitehorse.

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We also presented several performing arts events in the summer of 2021, including live music at Yukon Riverside Arts Festival, and finally welcomed the return of live theatre and touring artists in the fall and winter of 2021-22.

All of this work has not been without frustration and disappointment. The many canceled events, last minute decision-making sessions, difficult conversations, and repeated rescheduling is not reflected on this list. As we transition back into mostly in-person performing arts events on a more regular basis and the return of touring artists of all disciplines, lessons learned during the pandemic remain relevant. We will continue to work hard to collaborate, listen to our community, work towards being more accessible, and contribute to the well-being of our community.

Dawson City International Short Film Festival

After a postponed festival in 2020 that ran over 2 weekends in October, the festival returned to its Easter weekend slot in 2021.

While still limited in attendance for safe seating, we adapted protocols by serving concessions to the audience in their seats, and also running another Drive-In Theatre outside the Palace Grand, which has proven to be a popular event. We also included outdoor projections, and were able to offer Macaulay House as a space for the Cold Cuts Video Festival, running concurrently with our festival.

The pared down festival did not hold workshops, but we were able to run a "Summer Celluloid" filmmaking workshop, offering local artists the opportunity to work in Super 8 or 16mm, hand processed film. 11 artists took part in the workshop which was held in July and August with a screening that was held as part of Arts Fest.

In November we were able to hold our Yukon48 Film Challenge. Another successful event with 39 films being made. Filmmakers were given the option to have their films go on to compete in the Canada Wide 48 Hour Film Challenge. Cud Eastbound's film went on to win Best Film, Best Director and Best Editing in this national event, with a screening at the TIFF Lightbox in Toronto.

In the fall, we also began preparing for the 2022 festival with selection committees screenings.

Yukon Riverside Arts Festival

Every summer since 2000, KIAC has invited artists, collectives, and visitors to partake in the Yukon Riverside Arts Festival (YRAF).

Held over the Discovery Days weekend, the 2021 festival provided visitors and locals of all ages with events and a variety of interesting and engaging activities, while still maintaining the necessary covid protocols and guidelines. We showcased the work of local artists and performers to a wider audience through a digital platform.

This was great for the development of both emerging and established artists, as well as providing them with income.

One of the main highlights came through our partnership with Parks Canada Klondike National Historic Sites. This gave us the opportunity to bring theatre and live shows back to the Palace Grand Theatre, while also housing many of our exhibits in the same building. Ivan Coyote's book launch event drew an audience eager to return to the Palace Grand after two years of inactivity, reaching capacity on Saturday August 14th. The original play "Days of Discovery" written, performed and produced by the Friends of The Palace Grand Theatre Society was unanimously described as one of the top highlights of the weekend.

We are especially proud of our role in helping bring back stage productions to the Palace Grand Theatre, a heritage building and beloved community venue with a rich history. Of course, the main hurdle we faced, as with every other event in 2021, was the challenge of event planning in a small rural community during a global pandemic.

A big component of the adaptation of this festival to covid times was the 2021 online experience at www.yraf.ca. An online archive and presentation was developed in 2020 as a way to expand the festival to those who couldn't attend due to restrictions, distance or health concerns. The documentation shared on our website in 2021 built on the virtual archive presented as part of the 2020 festival in response to pandemic restrictions.

The 2021 festival was able to present more in-person events and exhibition viewings. Due to the online component being so well received and appreciated by both artists and the public, the archive will continue to be shared online for viewers far and wide. Feedback for this initiative has been positive all across the board.

Now that we have a better understanding of the needs and the trajectory of this project, YRAF is excited about the possibility of expanding and refining its virtual experience, taking advantage of what this medium has to offer.

ODD Gallery

Since 2000, the ODD Gallery has developed a rich and diverse schedule of year-round programming and special events that support, encourage and facilitate the creation, presentation, dissemination, education and research of contemporary visual arts.

These activities are positioned in a regional, national and international context, providing local audiences access and connection to a diversity of visiting artists and practices while also supporting the development and presentation of local and regional artists.

2021 began with Skawennati's futuristic installation and machinima based on the Haudenosaunee confederation story. This touring exhibition designed specifically for children was initiated by Centre VOX in Montréal.

The partnership with Centre VOX and Skawennati was a real highlight and, in collaboration with Robert Service School, we were able to engage the majority of local students with tours and educational programming and activities developed by VOX. Following this success we intend to work with VOX on touring exhibitions and youth outreach in the future (coming in 2025). As Skawennati was unable to travel, local artist, writer, committee member and friend of the artist, Charles Atlas Sheppard, jumped in to share a conversation about her work and processes.

Later in 2021, two solo exhibitions by
Dawson City artists were featured: one
filled with drawings around the sacred
liminality of disability and transness by
Kim Edgar & the other an immersive, story
and myth-filled installation entered via
East Coast kitchen fridge door by Bennie
Allain.

We also hosted SOVA's annual end of year exhibition and an impressive POP UP Member's Exhibition.

Dan Starling waited out travel restrictions and immunization line ups only to face wildfire evacuation alerts but made it to Dawson in August for the last days of his exhibition, Unsettled Histories, which employed printmaking to challenge the stability of colonial occupations.

We also saw a shipping crate and its packing materials unfold to become a complete installation speaking to globalization by Sangmin Lee.

The final exhibition of 2021 was a reflection on loss of memories and a parent by Ursula Handleigh and Anna Heywood-Jones who also hosted a virtual conversation series around the intersection of art & grief.

An additional virtual event took place through a new partnership with STEPS Public Art and their CreateSpace BIPOC Public Art Residency: *Art in Alternative Spaces*, a panel discussion which included local artist Bo Yeung.

We continue to present artist talks and to commission exhibition texts for each exhibition but this year we really missed the celebratory experience of gatherings and collaborations that used to be a regular part of gallery programming.

Because of this we set our sights on a mentorship project that would get going early in 2022.

It was also a year of personal hardship and I am very thankful to my coworkers for stepping up when needed and for taking over and executing another challenging, yet very successful, socially distanced pandemic Holiday Art & Craft Fair. This event supported local artists and makers as well as gallery and residence programming.

Proposals for general exhibitions continue to be accepted for a single deadline annually, and are juried by our volunteer gallery & residency committee. We consistently receive a high volume of submissions from a diversity of artists regionally, across Canada and beyond, which makes for a very challenging selections process! A sincere thank you to the committee and to our volunteers, which included a solid roster of SOVA volunteers this year!

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



• This report uses a 15-month fiscal year reflects a change in fiscal year from Dec 31 annually, to Mar 31.


• KIAC typically experiences a higher influx of revenues and expenditures between Jan-Mar annually, which accounts for a higher than expected % change.

KIAC Earned Revenue

- Earned revenues accounted for 10.3% of total revenues.
- Past years, earned revenues accounted for between 18-25%. The relative reduction in earned revenues is a result of an increase in COVID-relief funding and absolute reduction in revenue.



LOOKING FORWARD

Honouring our past. Re-envisioning our future.

We'll soon be celebrating two big birthdays! DCAS turns twenty-five next year, and KIAC turns twenty-five in 2025. We'll be planning birthday celebrations to honour our accomplishments over the last quarter century, such as:

- Renovating two derelict buildings into vibrant community hubs, the Klondike Institute of Art and Culture and Yukon School of Visual Arts;
- Establishing three annual festivals;
- Creating a sustainable arts-based economy and contributing to Dawson's vibrancy.

Our upcoming priorities for the coming years are to:

- Plan celebrations for the 25th Anniversary of KIAC, and honour past contributors,
- Maintain and repair current assets (ie. Dënäkär Zho/KIAC),
- Renovate Dënäkär Zho/KIAC to reflect current use, maximize space, & improve accessibility,
- Lobby for the increase in core funding to reflect current cost of business by highlighting our contributions to tourism and community wellbeing,
- Re-envision Macaulay House & secure a new location for Artist in Residency program, if needed,
- Build systems for succession, retention, and communication within leadership (board, committees, and staff),
- Increase, then maintain earned revenue at 20-25% of total revenue, through annual fundraising, sponsorship program, and legacy donation programs.
- Review and update bylaws following transition to new Societies Act, and
- Create new and innovative ways to meaningfully engage with Tr'öndëk Hwëch'in Citizens and Government.



We can't wait to see what the next 25 years will bring!
